

As climate chaos intensifies, harder and more violent borders are constructed across the planet while technology companies organize our intensifying digital connections according to extractive and capitalist logics. To examine the meaning of video in this moment is to ask about the future of politics and of human life on earth.

You will notice a throughline of politically engaged materials in the symposium that runs from the Algerian Revolution through contemporary diasporic identities, intersecting with matters of race, gender, and ecology in many places. These selections were made before current events in Palestine / Israel reminded us once again that the securing of unjust borders is no pathway to peace.

This symposium brings together scholar-artists and researcher-practitioners from the varied worlds of videographic film criticism, performance-based video, visual anthropology, experimental filmmaking, video art, and more. I am grateful to all of you for coming here to exchange ideas, questions, and desires for the future.


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
